Quambone:

‘Gateway to the Macquarie Marshes’.

Quambone lies 57km North-West of Coonamble and 600km from Sydney.

Part of the Coonamble Shire, the key industries include cattle, wheat, wool, fat lambs and cotton. The Quambone district has a population of 197. This charming little village has two quaint bush churches, tennis courts, swimming pool and the smallest operational library in NSW.

Only 57km from Coonamble on a sealed road, Quambone has a small two teacher school set in pleasant surroundings, Australia’s smallest library, two churches, a friendly Hotel/Motel and Store. Quambone’s main attractions are the Macquarie Marshes, The Marthaguy Picnic Races held in September and the Quambone Polocrosse Carnival held in July/August

What to see and do

- ▶ Drive or walk around the historic sites in the village
- ▶ Pop in to the General Store or Hotel and meet a local
- ▶ Head out to the viewing platform for the Macquarie Marshes
- ▶ Take in a Polocrosse game or the annual Marthaguy Picnic Races
- ▶ Visit the historic cemetery.

History

The area known today as Quambone was part of George Gibsons large squatterage dating back to 1844/45 which later became Quambone Station.

At one point it was proposed that Quambone would be on the rail line and the village had three hotels, numerous shops, bakeries, blacksmiths, a cordial factory, bank and numerous sawmills.

Whilst only a few of the original buildings remain their sites are marked on the map within this brochure.

The buildings now used as classrooms at Quambone School include the original schools from Ellemeek and Gilgoin.

For more information on the history of Quambone the book titled “Quambone-1894-1994” can be viewed at the Coonamble Shire Library in Coonamble.

Indigenous

The Aboriginal people who lived in the region were almost certainly members of the Weilwan people. They were hunters who lived around the waterways of the area including the Marra and Marthaguy Creeks, Macquarie and Castlereagh Rivers.

The primary school houses a unique collection of photographs of the local

Weilwan tribe taken by Sydney based photographer Charles Kerry in 1898.

Sundowner Hotel/Motel

Meet the locals and stop for a drink at the Sundowner. The Hotel was built on the site of the old sawmill in 1965. Cold Drinks, Meals, Accommodation, Beer Garden.

Macquarie Marshes

The Marshes are approximately 100kms long and 25-30kms wide and support a wide range of plants and animals. The Marshes contain extensive areas of common reed, cumbungi, river redgum woodlands, coolibah woodlands and water couch grasslands.

The Macquarie Marshes covers 200,000 hectares and is recognized as the major colonial waterbird nesting area in Australia. The Macquarie Marsh Nature Reserve covers approx 20,000 hectares and is recognized under the Ramsar Convention as a Wetland of International importance.

The reserve is managed by the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service. The remaining 90% is mainly private land managed for agricultural purposes. The Nature Reserve is mostly surrounded by private land and it is important to respect this when visiting.

Quambone War Memorial Hall

The Hall was originally Oddfellows lodge built in 1912 and bought for 225 pounds after World War 1 as a War Memorial. The hall can be rented for public or private events and is administered by the Quambone Resources Group.

Saint Paul's Anglican Church was completed in 1899. Originally situated behind the present school site, but the area was found to be too boggy after rain so was moved to the current site by three tractors borrowed from 'Sandy Camp'. The Sacred Heart Catholic Church was built in 1905.

Some of the school buildings were formerly schools from outlying areas and were moved into Quambone when the schools closed. The library contains a photo display by Charles Kerry of one of the last Aboriginal initiation ceremonies to take place in Australia. The current school building was built in 1909'

Quambone Sports Ground

Includes the Racecourse and Polocrosse fields and is home to a number of sporting clubs. New facilities were constructed in 2007 which include a covered area, new kitchen and bar facilities.

Quambone Polocrosse Club

The original Quambone Polocrosse Club was formed in 1959 and played for approximately three years. The Club reformed in 1976 and has continued to the present day holding a 30 year reunion in October 2006. A Polocrosse carnival is held annually at the Quambone Sportsground. The Quambone Polocrosse Club colours are maroon & white.

They have a maroon playing shirt with a white collar, white trim on the sleeves and white middle band. The saddle cloth is also maroon with maroon trim and maroon 'Q' on both sides.

Pony Club

The Quambone Pony Club formed in 1962 and still continues today. The Quambone Pony Club holds rally days at the Quambone Sports ground once a month and at other times by arrangement with members.

Members compete at Gymkhanas and local shows. Some members attend Pony Club Camps hosted by neighboring clubs.

Their uniform is a white long sleeved shirt, Royal Stewart tartan tie, Navy Blue V necked jumper and fawn jodhpurs. Saddle cloth is white with a navy trim and navy 'Q' on both sides.
